6. SPECIAL GUESTS

- Ernie Maynard's Family

On behalf of the Mayor and Town Council, Deputy Mayor Pyznar presented a proclamation to Ernie Maynard's family for his lifelong dedication to Enfield and the US military. During his years in the service, he received many awards and accolades. He spent many years volunteering for a variety of Enfield organizations and clubs. He was recognized for his selfless service and many achievements. Ernie was truly a hometown hero.

His son, Wayne Maynard, said that his father was proud of his state, country, town, and community. His father had two wishes: that everyone would smile, and that everyone would serve their community. He passed out prayer cards in remembrance of his father and explained that the prayer on the back was written by Ernie.

Councilor Mangini stated that she was honored to have the pleasure of knowing Ernie. She thanked his family for allowing her to be a part of celebrating him. Ernie's son Martin Maynard thanked everyone who came out to celebrate his father over the last few weeks. Mayor Nelson thanked the Maynard family and called Ernie a true American patriot who will be very missed.

7. PUBLIC COMMUNICATION AND PETITIONS

George Young, 8 Holly Lane

Mr. Young wished all the Councilors seeking re-election good luck. Mr. Young asked if it was possible to have the auditors attend the next regular Council meeting to explain their findings and the annual report for year-end June 30, 2024. He wanted to know why Enfield had so many internal control issues as well as a custodial credit risk. He said that if there was a bank failure, the town would be at risk of losing money since it is not in the town's name. For the last two years, the balance has been between \$24 and \$26M. He was concerned about the lack of formal policy and procedure necessary to reduce risk levels in the Finance and Treasury functions. He encouraged the Town Council and Town Manager's office to review the comments that had been issued over the years.

Mr. Young believed that item 13E on the agenda was worth discussing because he believed it was a case of bad budgeting or "robbing Peter to pay Paul." The item includes a couple of transfers that were necessary to cover under-budgeting, overspending, or miscategorized expenses. It was his belief that they had solved the electricity issue years ago, but now they were re-visiting it. He said that it was fortunate there were unspent funds so there would be no impact on the FY25 budget.

Angela Foss, 16 Crescent Beach Drive

Ms. Foss said she had not received any further information on the Parkman roof since the last Council meeting, as promised. Ms. Foss wished the Councilors good luck with the upcoming election.

Jim Maloney, 39 West View Drive

On behalf of the Veterans' Council, Mr. Maloney announced that the annual Veterans Day Parade would be held on November 9th at 1pm, starting at the Little Sisters of the Poor and ending on the Town Green. Mr. Maloney formally invited the Mayor and members of the

Council, BOE, police, and fire departments to participate and asked residents to come out and enjoy the parade and partake in the remembrance ceremonies.

Mr. Maloney also stated that the annual Marine Corp Birthday Breakfast, hosted by the American Legion Post 80 will be held on Saturday, November 8th at 9:00am to celebrate the 250th birthday of the US Marine Corp. 100% of the proceeds go to Toys for Tots. Tickets are \$20 per person.

8. COUNCILOR COMMUNICATIONS AND PETITIONS

Councilor Cekala thanked Enfield High Youth Vote Council for putting on a "Meet the Candidates Night". Ms. Cekala said that on Wednesday, October 22nd at 6pm at JFK there will be a Community Conversation regarding the PreK-5 master plan for the elementary schools. The topic will be the current conditions of the elementary schools. She encouraged residents to attend and see what the committee has been working on.

Councilor Santanella congratulated the Culture and Arts Commission on the amazing Art Squash exhibit at Thompson Hall. The artists presented their interpretations of squash through various mediums, and hundreds attended the event. He thanked the Jack o' Lantern Committee for the event held this past Saturday. He said it was a great family event on the Town Green and was well-attended. He reminded residents that the holiday season was approaching, and the Enfield Food Shelf's needs would be greater this year. The Food Shelf anticipated the need for an additional 250 turkeys and asked anyone who had the means to donate to do so.

Councilor Cressotti addressed Ms. Foss and stated that a purchase order had been issued for the environmental assessment. Once the assessment is completed, they will schedule a plan review and submit the reimbursement application to the state. Silver Petrucelli is doing the design work. The budgeted amount is roughly \$2.9M but may come in under budget at \$2.3M. The construction is predicted to be completed in the summer of 2026.

Mr. Cressotti attended a fundraising event at the Warming Center where Councilor Mangini and himself judged beards and yodeling. He said that the Warming Center was opened last year for 121 consecutive nights with approximately 3,500 overnight stays and an average of twenty-eight guests per night. Mr. Cressotti said a number of councilors also attended the annual KITE meeting. He said that KITE director, Hannah Song, did a great job. They recognized Senator Kissell for his work with Early Education. This Friday, October 24th, from 9-11am, the Social Services Department and Enfield Connects will kick off their event to discuss senior loneliness.

Councilor Mangini said that October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month and encouraged

residents to donate to the cause. Ms. Mangini said the Warming Center fundraiser was a fun event. The Rotary Club will be hosting a line dancing fundraiser on November 1st at the Elks Club. Tickets are \$25 per person, and the event will run from 6-10pm. The money raised will go towards the Rotary scholarship fund. Ms. Mangini also stated that her father was a Marine who served in the Korean War. She has had the privilege of attending past Marine Corp Birthday Breakfasts and plans on attending the upcoming event as well. She invited residents to attend and support the event.

Councilor Nasuta said that it had been an honor and privilege to serve on the Enfield Council and represent the residents of Enfield. He wanted to thank the Councilors who he served with as well as town employees who he had worked alongside the past two years.

Councilor Rousseau stated that he is unsure of who will be serving on the Council at the next meeting, but that two of the current Councilors would not be seeking re-election: Jim Nasuta and Mike Ludwick. He thanked them for their dedication and service to the Town of Enfield over the years. He said that both councilors took him under their wings when he joined the Council two years ago. He said that they have served the town with integrity and honor and have done amazing things for Enfield. He thanked them for their service and wished them well in their endeavors.

Councilor Unghire thanked Alex's Army for another great job at the Jack o' Lantern festival. She also thanked Riley's School of Dance. Ms. Unghire said she looks forward to the Veterans Day parade. She commended the Enfield High School Band for their performance on the Town Green.

Councilor Hendrickson asked if the town was still giving away the recycling bins for free or if there was now a charge. Mr. Hendrickson asked if they have created a safety plan for the walking path on Town Farm and Broad Brook Roads as previously discussed. Mayor Nelson said that they have installed guard rails.

Councilor Ludwick stated that during the last General Government and Finance meeting they had discussed a possible moratorium on solar fields. Mr. Ludwick asked if it was possible to have an update for Friday's meeting since the Council has authority to do something. He believed it was important to address the solar fields because of the amount of farmland in Enfield. He also wanted the Veteran's exemption discussed.

Deputy Mayor Pyznar attended the Art Squash event and was pleasantly surprised, as she had never attended the event before. She brought along her granddaughter, who is a budding artist and she loved it. The Jack o' Lantern festival over the weekend drew a large

crowd. She gave a shout-out to Enfield Deli & Produce for offering pumpkins at the festival for \$1.75. They also set up the carving station at the event. She said that all the bleachers at the event were covered in pumpkins. Assistant Town Manager Bielenda and Captain Held were judges for the evening. She enjoyed seeing all the kids in costume and everyone having a great time. Ms. Pyznar also attended the KITE event and said Hannah Song is doing a great job in her position. She also attended the ERfC Farm to Table event, which had a smaller attendance than in years past. She said it was a great event and a wonderful meal.

Ms. Pyznar said the school modernization project will be one of the largest projects that Enfield has taken on. She encouraged everyone to attend the Community Conversation. The Registrars of Voters asked Ms. Pyznar to provide the highlights in regard to Early Voting. Early Voting will run from October 20th to November 2nd between the hours of 10am to 6pm, except for October 28th and 30th when the hours are 8am to 8pm. Any registered Enfield voter is eligible for Early Voting. Same Day Registration takes place during Early Voting hours, allowing individuals to register and vote on the same day. Election Day is November 4th from 6am to 8pm, at the voters' regular district polling locations. Same-Day Registration will also be available on Election Day at the Town Hall.

Councilor Unghire thanked Mr. Nasuta and Mr. Ludwick for their service to the Town of Enfield. She said it was a pleasure to have served with both of them. Her time with Mr. Ludwick started when they were on the BOE, and they were tasked with selling the old band uniforms and sports uniforms to earn money for when the schools merged.

Mayor Nelson explained that there were many individuals involved in the Art Squash event, including Library Director Jason Neely, Cultural Arts Chair Emily Clifford, the entire Cultural Arts Commission, and all the artists. Mr. Nelson said he was unsure of what he was going to see when he went to the event but discovered a lot of talent. He also encouraged residents to attend the Community Conversation at JFK to get a better idea about the condition of the schools and ideas for modernization. As always, the Jack o' Lantern Festival was a huge success, showcasing all the pumpkins and costumes. The Enfield Together Coalition is sponsoring the Enfield Connects event at Asnuntuck on Friday, October 24th, and hopes everyone can attend since the topic is about loneliness and the impact on seniors.

Mr. Nelson said it has been his honor and privilege to serve the Town of Enfield as Mayor. He said that the Council members volunteer for the love of their community, and they work together to do what is best for the town, community and residents. He believed they accomplished a lot in the last two years.

9. TOWN MANAGER REPORT AND COMMUNICATIONS

Town Manager Coppler provided a presentation discussing multiple topics that have been a concern to councilors, including the roof replacement timeline for Parkman School and the Roads 2021 project. The Roads 2021 project slides included the completed roads, roads to be completed, and those under final design. There may also be roads that do not have enough funding to complete. Mayor Nelson asked if the streets that may not get completed due to funding would be a priority for the Roads 2026 project. It was explained that the roads that have been designed would become a priority when the next referendum is approved. Councilor Hendrickson said that when the roads index was discussed back in 1999, it was decided that the worst roads would be completed first. Mr. Coppler said the funding for the Abbe Road sidewalks was short, so an application for LOTCIP was submitted. He believed they would be presenting the next Council with the pavement preservation index to get it on the ballot for November 2026.

Mr. Coppler said that a resolution to join the Connecticut Municipal Development Authority was passed which authorized the signing of the MOU once it was approved and negotiated by the Town Attorney. The MOU is almost finished, and he expected it to be signed within a few weeks. One of the issues is how zoning is perceived, and it would be something they can back out of if need be. It was important that Enfield decisions stayed in Enfield and were not determined by the state.

Mr. Coppler extended an invitation to CT DOT on behalf of the Council to attend an open meeting to discuss the proposed State Service Route 496. He also provided them with the list of questions the Council would like to have answered. The CT DOT is willing to meet with the Council but not in a public session. He believed that more than likely they would need to gather in a subcommittee meeting. They are expected to move forward around the beginning of November. Mayor Nelson stated that he reached out to Representative Hall for her contact at DOT because he was not pleased that they were not willing to meet for a televised public meeting. He believed since they wanted domain over a public road, they should discuss the decision in public. Councilor Santanella explained that there are no partisan contacts within the state departments, so Representative Hall would more than likely have the same contact as him. Mr. Santanella believed it was important to meet sooner rather than later within a subcommittee setting. He did not expect the state to change their mind within ten days. Mayor Nelson demanded that the State Representatives and Senator Kissel work harder to schedule a public meeting and only fall back on a subcommittee meeting if they do not get them to agree. Councilor Ludwick asked that the CT DOT contact information be provided on the website so that residents can reach out to them once the work starts.

Mr. Coppler looked into the Central Library swing set and broken equipment. He explained the pivot pieces at the top of the swings needed to be replaced and there is only one company who makes the pieces, which cost around \$4,500. He believed that the Rotary Club was reluctant to pay that amount, so the town is researching funding sources in order to get them in working condition. Mayor Nelson clarified that the town missed the Rotary's deadline for grants. The Rotary is in the process of applying for another grant but cannot commit funds until they have been awarded the money.

Mr. Coppler stated that the sinkhole on the Henry Barnard blacktop has been there for a while, and they are confident they know why it is happening in that area. Until it is dug up, they will not know for sure the exact reason why it has caved. Currently, there is no money available for the project, but they intend to add it to a future budget.

A draft of the school audit has been submitted to the Superintendent for his review. He expects his own copy of the draft within the next week or so. After he reviews it, it will be available to the Council. A November timeline is expected for its release and presentation to the Council. Mayor Nelson believed that the audit should be released to the public and that they should schedule the audit company to attend the first new Council meeting as a special guest.

Mr. Coppler agreed that the traffic traveling past Caronna Market is faster than it should be, and sometime after 2007, the crosswalk that was there disappeared. The town needs to ensure that the crosswalk is ADA compliant when installing a new crosswalk. He reminded the Council that they were awarded roughly \$1M by Congressman Joe Courtney's office for a street scape in that area. He would prefer that if they were to continue with the crosswalk project that they do it in conjunction with the street scape. He believed he would have an update for the next Council meeting. Councilor Santanella stated that there are more requirements than just painting the crosswalk, and that it would need appropriate signage, curbing, and advanced notice of installation. He questioned the number of residents reaching out with concerns about the lack of a crosswalk, and Mr. Coppler explained that there have not been many, but it should be addressed from a risk management point of view. They want to remain compliant, especially since the concern has been brought up.

Mayor Nelson has received numerous complaints and stated that it had been a dedicated crosswalk for over 100 years. Pat Tallarita, who owns the former fire station, was fine with the re-installation of the crosswalk as long as the town signed a release stating it was his property, and he would not be held liable if something were to happen. He would like to see the installation done soon, because once the state owns that street, it would be near impossible to even get signage put up. Councilor Ludwick said that the town also has TIF

money that could be used. Mr. Ludwick said that when you are driving down North Main Street, going left and there is a car parked on the corner, you cannot see, which poses a larger problem. He believed it was a multi-faceted issue, and traffic-calming procedures may help.

Mr. Coppler stated that the next Council would take on the solar field moratorium. He agreed that it was important to protect farmland, and they needed to work together with the Conservation and Agricultural Committees. He said that it should be a whole process rather than just a moratorium. Mr. Coppler further stated that there was money left over from the expansion of Post Office Road and Town Farm Road, and the formalization of a safety plan for the walking and bike path would be forthcoming.

Assistant Town Manager Bielenda expressed his best wishes to Councilors Nasuta and Ludwick, saying it had been a pleasure working with them and wished them luck with future endeavors. Mr. Bielenda said he enjoyed working with the current Council over the last two years and thanked them for the privilege of working with them.

Councilor Rousseau said that a component of the grant is police compliance checks, but the allocated funds do not specifically state how much will be set aside for the police department for such checks. He asked what role the police department would play, and whether they would have any say on how the funds are spent, since it appears to be a Social Services grant. Social Services Director Cynthia Guerrieri said the department

received the grant after applying with the Council's approval back in the spring. It was a very competitive national grant, awarded largely in part to the work of the Enfield Together Coalition. The money will be used to help prevent alcohol abuse among 12 to 20-year-olds. Historically, the police have worked with Social Services twice a year under the direction of Lieutenant Piedemonti to do compliance checks. Lt. Piedemonti utilizes the Police Explorers for those compliance checks and overtime is what is contributed to the police department. She stated that the town had received this grant in the past prior to her employment. She explained that every other year a survey is sent to JFK students to collect data on how often students may be using alcohol. Over the years they have seen a decline. The effectiveness of the program gets reported using the data they collect.

Deputy Mayor Pyznar questioned the \$32,000 that was allocated to "Other Professional", and asked if it was being used for positions. Ms. Guerreri said that the funds are used for continued work with outside consultants, including social marketing campaigns and strategic communications. The money was not being used for staffing or new positions.

Jeffrey Foss, 16 Crescent Beach Drive

Mr. Foss clarified that he constructed the fence at Thompson Court. Mr. Foss said that the owners of 6 Thompson Court created a mess on the property. He owns the surrounding buildings and personally brings trash from those properties to the dump every week, but their trash migrates to his properties.

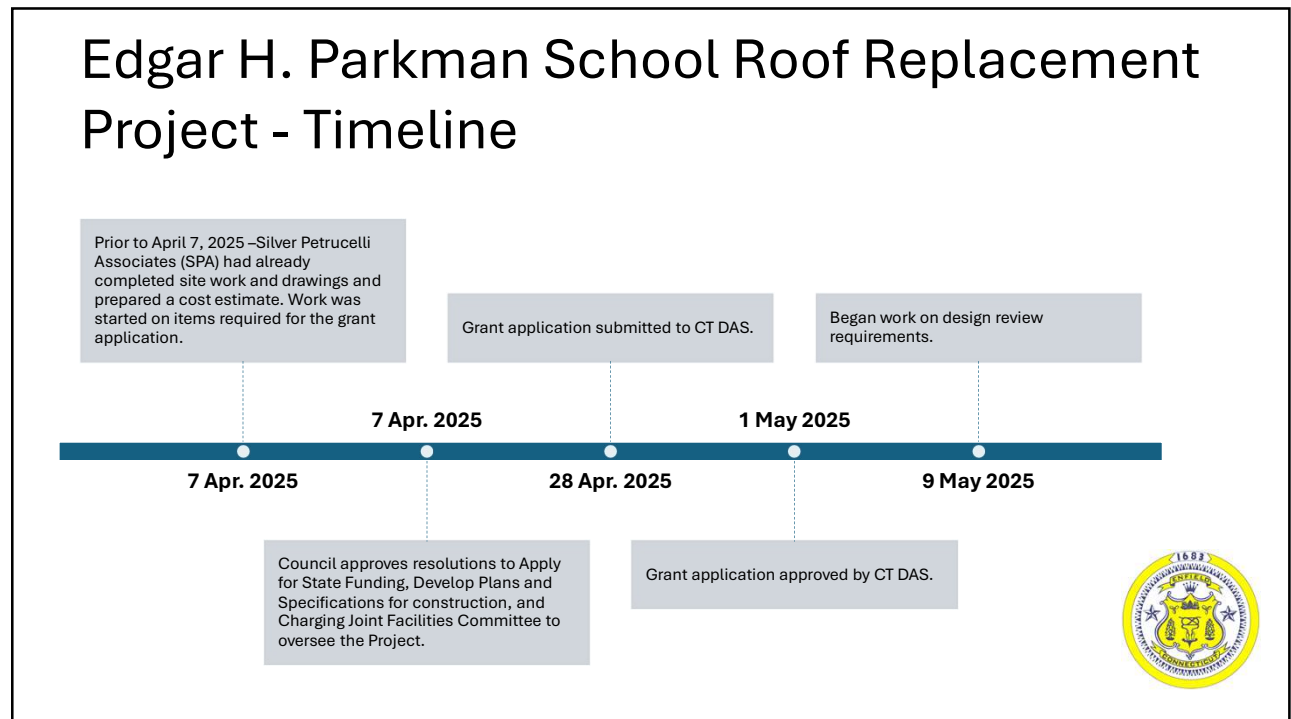

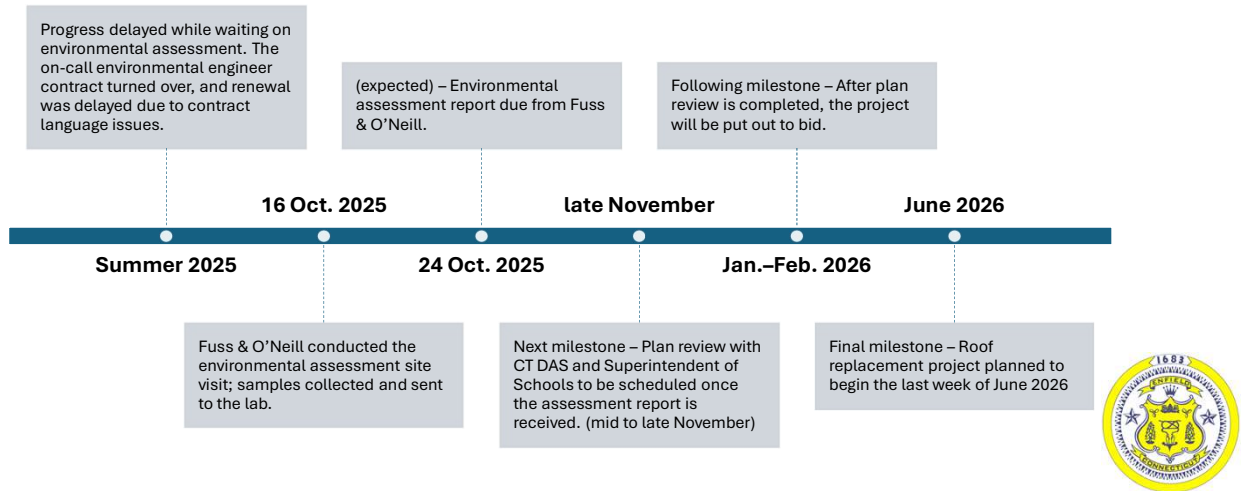
